

Healthy Lincoln County Summer Food Service Program 2017

Learning does not end when school lets out. Neither does the need for good nutrition. Nearly 18 million students depend on free or reduced-price school lunches and breakfasts for 9 months out of the year. For many of these children, summer vacation exposes them to an increased risk of hunger and developmental decline. Children who miss breakfast or lunch are more likely to be sick, absent or tardy, disruptive in class,



and inattentive. They also score lower on achievement tests. Good nutrition is essential for learning in school. The Summer Food Service Program, with support from the USDA, gives our communities in Lincoln County an opportunity to improve a child's physical and social development while providing nutritious meals. The Summer Food Service Program helps all students return to school ready to learn.
