# RECORD NUMBER OF MEDICATIONS RETURNED AT SEMI-ANNUAL DRUG TAKE BACK DAY

On April 28th, 600 pounds of medicine were collected in Lincoln County, and over 28,000 pounds of medication were collected across Maine during the semi-annual Drug Take Back Day, according to the Drug Enforcement Agency.

Maine dropped off the most unwanted and expired medications in all of New England. While this wasn't a statewide record (last fall, over 41,000 pounds were collected statewide), this was a high point for returns in Lincoln County.

While the next Drug Take Back Day will be in October, anyone can dispose of medications year-round at their local police department or the

Lincoln County Sheriff's Office. If that is not an option, it is recommended the people dispose of medications at home by mixing them with used coffee grounds or kitty litter before throwing away.

#### PHOTO PROJECT ON DISPLAY, GIVES YOUTH A VOICE



Healthy Lincoln County partnered with four local schools to conduct PhotoVoice with students from grades 6-12. PhotoVoice is participatory-action research strategy by which students capture risk and protective factors towards substance use through photographs. Students spent several weeks critically examining factors about themselves, their friends, family and community that either encourage or discourage the use of drugs or alcohol. The photos will be displayed across Lincoln County throughout the month of May in an effort to create awareness and conversation about areas for change in our community.

The public is invited to view the students' photos in several ways. The photos will be on display throughout the month of May at Rising Tide Market, Waldoboro Public Library, Skidompha Library and Wiscasset Community Center for community members to enjoy. There will be a partner event with the

Miller School student art exhibit at Tidemark Gallery in Waldoboro on May 14 and 15, both from 4-6pm.

"In order for us to fully address the issue of youth substance use in our community, we need to give our youth a voice. This project allows them to express how they see the issue of substance use," says Emily Bauer, Project Coordinator of Healthy Lincoln County. She adds, "PhotoVoice allows us to hear directly from our youth, but it's ultimately up to adults in the community to hear what they have to say and work with them to make changes."

Photos have been submitted from 6th graders at Miller School, 7th and 8th graders at Nobleboro Central School, and high school students at Boothbay Region High School and Wiscasset Middle High School. School-based groups were advised by a variety of faculty members, including art teachers, school social workers, and health center staff.

# YOUTH, LAW ENFORCEMENT, RETAILERS PARTNER TO PREVENT UNDERAGE DRINKING WITH STICKER SHOCK



On May 1, students from Boothbay Region High School worked with staff Tammy Blackman and Evelyn Andrews, School Resource Officer Larry Brown, and local stores to place thousands of neon orange stickers on multi-packs of alcohol.

The stickers are designed to reach adults who might purchase alcohol and provide to minors, which can result in fines up to \$2,000 and possible jail time. Sticker Shock, among other substance use prevention events, highlights how every part of our community plays an important part in keeping young people safe. Providing resources to businesses can reach parents and adults that have a direct

influence in helping youth make healthy choices to stay drug and alcohol free.
